CITY GOVERNMENT MONTH

January is "City Government Month" and the City of Erlanger will be celebrating by educating grades K-12 about local government. Schools that Erlanger residents may attend will be participating. While the K-3 age groups will only be involved in a city government based coloring contest, it still gives them a connection. Fourth and fifth graders get to imagine themselves as Mayor of Erlanger and write an essay on their political goals and aspirations in that position. Sixth through eighth grades get to participate as a class and research a historical site in the City of Erlanger and see if it qualifies for a historical marker. Finally, grades ninth through twelfth will also participate as a class and create a city budget.

One of our focuses is that city government is the closest form of government to citizens. It is important to be knowledgeable about this form of government and to get involved. A REMINDER FROM THE FIRE MARSHAL

Erlanger Fire/EMS would like to remind you that heating equipment is a leading cause of home fires during the months of December, January and February, and trails only cooking equipment in home fires yearround.

Facts & Figures (Provided by NFPA)

- In 2005, heating equipment was involved in an estimated 62,200 reported U.S. home structure fires, with associated losses of 670 civilian deaths, 1,550 civilian injuries, and \$909 million in direct property damage.
- In 2005 heating equipment fires accounted for 16% of all reported home fires (second behind cooking) and 22% of home fire deaths. Space heaters, whether portable or stationary, accounted for one-third (32%) of the home heating fires and three-fourths (73%) of home heating fire deaths in 2005.

Excluding small confined fires, heating equipment too close to things that can burn, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattress, or bedding, is by far the leading factor contributing to home heating fires (27%) and home heating fire deaths (53%).

Safety Tips

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable heater
- 2. Only use heating equipment that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- 3. Never use your oven for heating.
- If you have any appliances that operate on natural gas or propane, install and maintain carbon monoxide (CO) alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning.

AN UPDATE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS

Lighting the way for drivers and pedestrians, streetlights are vital to our everyday lives. With a multitude of streetlights throughout the city of Erlanger, we appreciate your help in identifying lights that are malfunctioning or in need of repair. The sooner we know they are out, the sooner we can contact the appropriate power company to get them fixed.

For streetlights that need attention in the Duke Energy Service Area contact 1-(800)-544-9500, for lights in the Owen Rural Electric service area please contact 1-(800)-372-7612, or if you are unsure of the service area that you live in please contact the Erlanger City Building at (859) 727-2525. Please make sure that you provide the following information: pole number/nearest physical address of the light, type of issue (out/flickering/burning during the day/etc.), and your name with a contact number.
