MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



All the talk lately has been about the lack of trust in government. "Take our country back!" "All they do is tax and spend!" Each of us has been subjected to this dialogue. The Tea Party has raised issues about government that have been simmering for years. Neither national political party is in good favor. The press is having a field day! On the local level, however, the news is much, much better.

The City of Erlanger's primary purpose is to provide public safety services. We think we have the finest police department in Northern KY, and perhaps in the Commonwealth. The national insurance rating organization, ISO, thinks we have one of the

finest fire departments in the Commonwealth. The EMS/paramedic service we operate won national recognition a few months ago. Our public works department is noted as being the best in snow removal in our region. It appears that your city is doing its job by providing high quality public services within a balanced budget. The financial pressures, however, are significant and there is no end of this in sight.

Your City Council and I appreciate the trust you placed with us to manage your money in a fiscally conservative manner. The City budget is YOUR budget, and you are free to examine and review it at any time. We all welcome any input you may have. I have challenged some folks who are critical of government spending to look at the Erlanger budget and let us know where we are 'fat,' where we waste your money, and how to make your budget leaner and more efficient. There have been few takers. We have unfilled positions due to retirements and resignations. There was no raise in the last budget for your employees and a minimal adjustment in the current budget. Try as we might, however, there just is not enough revenue to meet legitimate needs.

Your City Council made an extremely courageous decision to raise the payroll tax (for the 1st time in 17 years) on folks who work in Erlanger, and dedicated the new revenue for use in road repair and capitol purchases. The pressure to raise the real estate tax on property owners – you - above the annual adjustment has been relieved. This move created discussion in our business community about the wisdom of this move in these times, and the debate has been civil and enlightening. The need for the revenue is clear. The use is well-defined. When an ambulance dies, it must be replaced – and this happened last year, causing an unbudgeted draw down of reserve funds. One of our major pieces of fire equipment is obsolete and its replacement will cost you nearly 5 figures. The need is never ending.

We will start the 2011-2012 budget process with the newly-elected Council early next year. If you have any interest in the process or product, everyone affiliated with your government welcomes your input.

Finally, and on a personal note, I will begin my 2nd 4-year term as your Mayor in January. I have been connected with this City one way or the other most of my life, and am really honored to be your Mayor. My immediate predecessors, the late Fred Thomas and my friend Marc T. Otto, Sr., did a wonderful job in their terms of maintaining the quality city government you demand and deserve for your hard-earned dollars. My goal is to continue this, and find new ways (looking' outside of the box') to provide affordable, high quality service. Many thanks to you for your trust, concern and comments.

There is a growing concern for the Burn Ban which ends September 30th due to the extremely dry conditions. Kenton County Homeland Security/Emergency Management has issued that the burn ban that is currently in effect will be extended indefinitely. This means that no burn permits will be issued by Erlanger Fire/EMS. (727-2488)

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK

When you leave your home each day, you drive on city maintained streets to get where you are going. The car seat that your child is riding in may have been inspected by one of our police officers. You drive by a city park where children are playing. If you are involved in an accident you call 9-1-1, which is answered by an Erlanger dispatcher. Erlanger's police, fire, and emergency medical services will respond to assist you. No matter why you come to Erlanger, whether it is for employment or to live, services are expected. These same services require funding by the city. One of the sources for this funding is property taxes. No one likes to be taxed, especially with today's economy, but without revenues from property taxes, city governments would not be able to provide the services that everyone needs or wants. Remember, your needs may be different than your neighbor's needs. It is the city's responsibility to meet the needs of the community as a whole. Real estate taxes are calculated by multiplying the property's assessed value by the real estate tax rate. On September 21, 2010, Erlanger City Council set the real estate property tax rate at \$0.315 per \$100 and the personal property tax rate at \$0.418 per \$100 for the 2010.

Each year we get numerous calls from residents confused on why they are receiving two property tax bills. Only one is from the City of Erlanger. The other is from the Kenton County Sheriff's Department for your Kenton County property taxes. For questions regarding those bills and where to make payments, please contact the Sheriff's Department at 859-392-1800.

If you have an escrow account, DO NOT pay your city tax bill without contacting your mortgage company first. Each year we spend a great deal of time on duplicate payments where the mortgage company and the property owner both pay the tax bill. Refunds will not be issued until after January 2011.

This year property tax payments will not be able to be paid online. With our new website, we could not secure a "safe" line for tax payers to submit their credit card information. Credit card payments can be made through mail or by phone by calling 859-727-2525, prompt # 1.

If you are 65 years of age and older or are disabled, you may be eligible to receive a Homestead or Disability Exemption on your City of Erlanger and Kenton County property tax bills. To apply, please contact the Kenton County PVA at 859-392-1750.

FIRE MARSHAL'S ALARMING UPDATE

October is Fire Prevention month in Erlanger, and this year's theme is **Smoke Alarms: A sound you can live with**. In an effort to better educate communities throughout the U.S. about smoke alarm recommendations, the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is promoting "Smoke Alarms: A Sound You Can Live With!" as the theme for this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, October 3-9, which Erlanger Fire/EMS is supporting locally.

Many homes in Erlanger may not have any smoke alarms, not enough smoke alarms, alarms that are too old, or alarms that are not working. We want residents to understand that working smoke alarms are needed in every home, on every level (including the basement), outside each sleeping area and inside each bedroom. And, if a smoke alarm is 10 years old or older, it needs to be replaced.

Smoke alarms can mean the difference between life and death in a fire. NFPA statistics show that working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire nearly in half. But they must be working properly to do so. The association's data shows that many homes have smoke alarms that aren't working or maintained properly, usually because of missing, disconnected or dead batteries. Roughly two-thirds of all home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

NFPA and Erlanger Fire/EMS agree that interconnected smoke alarms offer the best protection; when one sounds, they all do. This is particularly important in larger or multi-story homes, where the sound from distant smoke alarms may be reduced to the point that it may not be loud enough to provide proper warning, especially for sleeping individuals.

Most people have a sense of complacency about smoke alarms because they already have one in their homes. Fire Prevention Week provides an excellent opportunity to re-educate people about smoke alarms, new technologies and expanded options for installation and maintenance. Ultimately, we want this year's campaign to serve as a call to action for households nationwide to inspect their homes to ensure that their families have the full smoke alarm protection that's recommended.

Erlanger Fire/EMS offers the following tips for making sure smoke alarms are maintained and working properly:

• Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button, and make sure everyone in your home knows their sound.

• If an alarm "chirps," warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.

• Replace all smoke alarms, including alarms that use 10-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they're 10 years old (or sooner) if they do not respond properly when tested.

Never remove or disable a smoke alarm.

POLICE CHIEF REPORT

FALL LEAF COLLECTION

School Opens: When driving near schools or school bus stops, please be aware that school is back in session and children are present. Every year we have a child struck by a vehicle either near school property or on their way to school. Pay attention to the School Zone Speed Limits. If you are cited for speeding when the lights are flashing or during the time when the limits are in effect, the fine will be doubled.

Thefts: We have seen a significant rise in the number of thefts from parked vehicles and homes in Erlanger and Crescent Springs. Use common sense; do not leave valuables in your vehicle and make sure to lock your doors. No items should be left in your vehicle, especially GPS type devises which have become a favorite of thieves. Ladies, do not leave your purses in your vehicle or if grocery shopping, do not leave them in the cart.

Burglary: We have also seen an increase in burglaries, thefts from homes. Keep all doors and windows locked. Leave lights on at night, thieves do not like to be seen. Most burglaries have been occurring in the day time. Be aware of this fact and if you see any suspicious activity, no matter what time of day, call 911. We would much rather come to find nothing than to find out later that a theft occurred.

The Public Works Department will begin their annual **leaf collection program** the week of October 25th, 2010 and it will continue through the week of December 6th, 2010. The collection schedule can be viewed on line at www.ci.erlanger.ky.us and will be available for pick up at the City Building, Heritage Bank, Fifth Third Bank on Dixie Highway at Cave Run, and the Bank of Kentucky. If you have submitted your e-mail address to be placed on our Resident E-mail Database, the schedule will be electronically sent to you. If you haven't, please visit www.ci.erlanger.ky.us to add your e-mail under "E-mail Notifications".

The Public Works Department has divided the city into different zones. When looking at the schedule, first locate what zone your street is in, then find your zone on the schedule. The schedule allows for each street to be collected four times throughout the collection period with the exception of Stevenson Road and Commonwealth Avenue that are only collected twice because of traffic control requirements.

This year, the last date of leaf collection will be Friday December the 10th. After this date, equipment used for leaf collection will be prepared for winter usage and leaf disposal will be the responsibility of the homeowner.

Please remember to keep leaf piles behind the curb and do not place them in the street. Leaves must be out to the curb the morning of your scheduled collection day. If the leaf pile is blocked in any manner or contains anything besides leaves, a notice will be left on your door explaining that they were unable to collect your leaves.

Always be on the look out for Public Works Employees working in your area during leaf collection season and do your part to help provide them with a safe working environment as they provide this invaluable service to you. Be patient as they stop to collect leaf piles in your neighborhood, do not follow any of the trucks and or equipment too closely, and be alert as you traverse through work zones that they have up.

In addition to the leaf collection program, The Public Works Department will also have their "**Christmas Tree Drop-off**" program again this year. Bare trees (no ornaments, plastic wrapping, lights) can be dropped off at 3516 Jack Scheben Drive from December 27th through January 10th. The trees will be turned into mulch that is made available to Erlanger's residents.
