You will notice a change in this edition of the Whistlestop newsletter. The City of Erlanger was approached by the Erlanger-Elsmere School District to join them in getting as much information out to the Erlanger community as possible. In doing this, you will find articles provided by their school district included in our newsletter, as well as articles for the City in their newsletter. This team effort will enable both organizations to reach more residents than before.

Many of you may have read in the newspapers about the 911 dispatch discussions between Kenton County and Erlanger. Our City currently dispatches for about 50% of the Kenton County residents and provides state of the art service. Some in Kenton County would like to combine County dispatch, Covington dispatch and Erlanger's PSCC under one roof. We are examining this concept, assisting the County in its efforts when asked, and trying to determine what will be in your best interests. Public safety is what we consider to be the overriding goal of emergency communication service. We know what we have here, but do not know what is being built by the county. We have asked many questions and issues remain unresolved. So, we continue to observe, assist, and inquire while the new dispatch operation is being built. In the meantime, Erlanger Public Safety Communications Center will continue to provide top of the line service to you and our neighbors until the other system is as good or better than what we currently operate. If you have questions or concerns about this issue, we would love to hear from you.

On a personal note, I took the oath of office on June 7, 2012 as the President-Elect of the Kentucky Bar Association. I am proud to not only serve Erlanger's residents as Mayor, but to serve many across the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

MAYORS MEET STUDENTS

The enthusiasm of Erlanger-Elsmere students for their community was evident May 2 as they engaged the cities' mayors in dialogue. Erlanger Mayor Tom Rouse and Elsmere Mayor Marty Lenhof graciously met with the 10 students of the Superintendent's Advisory Group at Lloyd Memorial High School. Superintendent Kathy Burkhardt and the Advisory Group invited the mayors so the students could share their ideas for community projects in the cities.

The dialogue was dynamic. The students, empowered to move forward, now are eager to put their ideas into action.

The students are interested in community engagement and beautification projects, including a possible mural. In the lively dialogue, the mayors suggested other community activities, too, such as projects involving residential neighborhoods in Erlanger and parks and recreation activities in Elsmere.

The student Advisory Group now will formulate plans for moving forward with community projects and for engaging many Lloyd and Tichenor students in the community activities. There will be more meetings and dialogue with city officials, too.

The goal of the project is twofold: valuable service learning opportunities for the students and community engagement and enhancement for the cities.

Dr. Burkhardt formed the group of student advisors and participated in the May 2 meeting with the mayors. The Advisory Group includes Lloyd's representatives on the Northern Kentucky Youth Advisory Board, which involves students from 20 high schools in Northern Kentucky.

The nonprofit organization Children Inc. also is instrumental in the Erlanger-Elsmere students' venture. Julie Wharton, of Children Inc., is an advisor to the student group as part of Children Inc.'s Mayerson Service Learning Initiative. The mission of the Children Inc. initiative, which has served 23,000 students and their communities, is to empower youth and help them become active citizens today and valued community members for life.

Firework Safety

Every year people have fireworks to set off to celebrate. Every year there are also injuries that occur due to the misuse of fireworks and also the malfunction of fireworks. Property loss is also a big concern when people are using fireworks. With real dry, warm weather, comes the possibilities of grass fires, house fires, and other types of fires that are unexpected.

Injuries from fireworks can fall into a broad range of categories. They can be as small as a minor burn to a finger and go as far as death if a large explosion occurs. Several burn injuries occur from sparklers and lighters lighting the fireworks. Firework explosions can cause people to lose fingers or cause serious injury if they explode around someone. Keeping a close eye on the surroundings and who is doing the lighting and handling of fireworks may help limit injuries from occurring.

It is a safe practice to keep some sort of water available while lighting and using fireworks. A bucket of water can be useful when using sparklers. When finished, you can throw your hot sparkler into a bucket of water to cool them. A hose in the yard with the water turned on can possibly limit the chances of a small fire turning into a big fire. Limiting where you light the fireworks will help control the possibility of fire. Setting of fireworks on concrete rather than grass will allow a firework to not ignite the grass. Keep safety in mind throughout the remainder of the summer.

I Want a Blue Fire Hydrant

Has anyone in the City of Erlanger wondered why the hydrants are painted different colors? People in the community have recently seen the fire department out in the area testing fire hydrants and will also see them out later on in the year. The fire department has been testing hydrants along with the Northern Kentucky Water District to ensure that the fire hydrant is properly working and can determine how much water can be obtained from that hydrant. Through calculations, the fire department can determine how much water is being flowed at given times. Each year the fire department also comes out and paints the hydrants to ensure that they look nice and are kept up. A lot of cities paint their hydrants and many of these hydrants have different colors on them. Some cities only use these colors as decoration to make the city look nice. Some cities, like the City of Erlanger, paint the hydrant to make it look nice but it also serves a purpose for the fire department.

The fire department assigns a color to the amount of flow from the hydrant. We use the calculations we obtain and match the color to the flow. Almost all hydrants will be yellow. The tops and sometimes the caps will be painted a different color to represent how much water is coming out. The colors that are used are Red, Orange, Green, and Blue. The fire department can easily approach a hydrant and look at the top color and determine how much water they should be getting out of that hydrant. All flows are based in gallons of water in one minute.

So if anyone has wondered why hydrants are different colors, they are to assist in letting fire apparatus operators determine how much water they can get into their apparatus. It also helps the firefighters determine how to handle the situation at hand and how much water they could possibly have on that scene. Residents can't just decide on what color they want. The colors have a meaning. The fire department also tries to stay on top of painting them to make our city look nice and presentable.

Keeping Vacation Safe

A lot of people may be planning summer vacations this year. Even though people are on vacation, they need to keep a safety conscious mind while at a new location. Hotels or condos are still capable of having problems and some things should be thought about before something was to happen.

Consider some of the following prior to an emergency:

- Take time to familiarize yourself with the fire escape plans located on the back of the hotel room door. If you are in a condo or house take time to familiarize you and your family with some escape plans.
- Locate the two closest exits.
- Count the number of doors between your room and the exit.
- Check and make sure the smoke detectors are working properly in your room.
- Look for a stairwell to exit. Elevators should not be used in a fire situation, so look for the closest stairwells when preplanning an escape.

If an emergency does occur:

- Check your door for heat prior to opening. If the door is cool, get low and slowly open in case there is smoke in the hallway. If the door is warm, leave the door shut and get to the window or balcony. Also, place wet towels around the bottom of the door to help prevent smoke from entering. Turn off the air conditioning and fans in order to prevent pulling smoke into the room.
- If the smoke is still up high, stay low and crawl to the nearest exit that you found upon your arrival at the hotel.
- Most importantly if you are able to crawl to the exit use the stairwell instead of the elevator. Stairwells are mostly designed as a safe place and are rated long enough to let people exit the building.

Vacations are supposed to be a time to have fun and relax. Keep some safety things in mind when on vacation to ensure that nothing will ruin your vacation.

2012 Lloyd Governors Scholars


Four students of Lloyd Memorial High School have been chosen to participate in the prestigious Governor's Scholars Program in Kentucky for 2012.

The four will be seniors in the 2012-2013 school year. They are attending the five-week residential scholars program this summer. As part of the honor as a chosen participant in the program, each scholar's tuition, room and board, and field trip expenses are fully paid by the program. The 2012 program is being held on the campuses of Bellarmine University, Centre College and Murray State University. About 1,000 students were chosen to participate at the program's three campuses this summer.

The Governor's Scholars Program is for outstanding high school students in Kentucky who are rising seniors. To participate in the program, students must be nominated by their high schools and then compete on a statewide level. Selection for the program is highly competitive, with an application process similar to that of prestigious colleges and universities.

The program originated in 1983 as a result of Kentucky leaders' concern that the state's "best and brightest" were leaving the state to pursue educational and career opportunities elsewhere without fully understanding the potential of their talents at home. The program's mission is to enhance Kentucky's next generation of civic and economic leaders. The Governor's Scholar Program provides academic and personal growth through the balance of a strong liberal arts program with a full co-curricular and residential life experience.

Providing guidance for drivers and pedestrians alike, street signs and streetlights are a vital part of our everyday lives. With a multitude of street signs and streetlights throughout the City, we appreciate your help in identifying signs that have been damaged or need replacement and streetlights that are malfunctioning or in need of repair. The sooner we are aware of an issue with either of these two things, the sooner we can get it addressed.

To report streetlights that need attention in the Duke Energy Service Area you may contact 1-(800)-544-6900 and for lights in

the Owen Rural Electric service area you may contact 1-(800)-372-7612. If you are ensure of the service area that you live in please contact the Erlanger Public Works Department at (859) 727-3893 or visit the Public Works Department page at www.ci.erlanger.ky.us to report the problem. Please make sure that you provide the following information: pole number/nearest physical address of the light, type of issue (out/flickering/burning during the day/etc.), and your name with a contact number.

Did You Know?

The Sign Shop of the Erlanger Public Works Department is responsible for approximately 4,900 regulatory signs that are located on city maintained streets. In addition, they produce specialty signs/banners for various city events, produce property stickers for several city departments, take care of all issues regarding street lights and produce the graphics/lettering for all vehicles and equipment in the Public Works Department Fleet. It requires 220.5 man hours to mow one rotation of the Parks, Grounds and Right of Ways that the Public Works Department Mowing Team (4 personnel) are responsible for maintaining. When you combine these 40 different areas located across the city together, it adds up to a total of 53.3 acres of mowing. During the month of May; Public Works Team Members were very been busy with Codes Remediation's as a result of citations issued by the Codes Enforcement Division of the Police Department. A total of 23 remediations were completed that required a total of 58.75 man hours of time.

Prescription Drug Disposal Program

Several months ago, the Erlanger Police Department partnered with the Kenton County Alliance and joined many other Northern Kentucky Agencies in a program aimed at getting expired and unused prescription pills out of the homes, off the streets and out of the hands of children. This program, know as the Prescription Drug Disposal Program has been huge success so far.



Citizens can bring these medicines to the main office at 505 Commonwealth Avenue during regular business hours, Monday thru Friday 8am – 5pm. You will be asked to sign a form acknowledging the drop off. The pills will then be placed in a secure box until they are taken to the county incinerator where they are disposed of.

Just recently the police department took 308 pounds of discarded medications to the incinerator for destruction.
